3. Preparing your computer before attending OSOS

All the sessions are designed to be practical, hands-on activities. Therefore, you need to bring your own laptop or desktop computer. All the workshop sessions will utilize open source tools (R, Python) and hence, have cross platform compatibility. Due to the virtual workshop format, our ability to provide hands-on assistance is limited. Therefore, we are providing separate instructions for **Beginner** and **Intermediate** level participants. We also suggest that having two screens may be optimal for following the Zoom stream while working on the data examples. Alternatively two devices - one for streaming and one for working may work equally well.

Beginner: Little or no prior experience with R or Python Intermediate: Some prior experience with R or Python, including use of Integrated Development Environment (IDE) or Python notebooks (eg. Jupyter).

3.1 Preparing for R sessions

Cloud-Based Beginner Level

RStudio is a well developed and powerful development environment (IDE) for R. IDEs are software that allow us to work on code in an interactive environment with code editing, console, file management, and visualization capabilities. Typically R and RStudio are installed locally on your computer (see Intermediate instructions if you want to do so). To avoid platform dependent issues that may arise in this virtual workshop, we **strongly recommend** that you use the cloud version of RStudio - called RStudio Cloud. To use this service, you will need to create a free account and have your login information ready before the workshop.

- 1. Go to <u>RStudio Cloud Free</u> and sign up using your email ID, login through your Google account or Github account.
- 2. Once you create your account and log in, please carefully read the <u>Guide</u> to understand the layout and functionality.
- 3. Instructions are provided in **Section 4.2** on how to upload your data files to RStudio Cloud

- 4. During the workshop you will be installing and loading packages needed for the analyses and visualization.
- 5. OPTIONAL: The free version of RStudio Cloud gives you 15 hours per month with 1GB RAM, and 1CPU. If you think you will use more than 15 hours of RStudio during the workshop, please consider the R and RStudio local installation (free) or upgrade to an academic version of RStudio Cloud (\$\$).

Intermediate Level

Download R: Go to the website (<u>www.r-project.org</u>) and select the link "download R" and you will be sent to a site with a list of CRAN Mirrors. Select the mirror nearest to you and you will be sent to the download page. Select the download link that is appropriate for your computer platform and follow the instructions on the following web pages. After you download the appropriate package, make sure to install R on your computer, by unpacking the download archive. Once installed, clicking the 'R' logo will open the console.

Download RStudio: RStudio is an Integrated Development Environment (IDE) that pack- ages file managing, code editing, and visualizer built in with the console. Go to the website (<u>www.rstudio.com/products/rstudio/download/</u>) and download RStudio Desktop with the Open Source License for free. Be sure to select the download link that matches your computer platform and install the program after download.

During the workshop you will be installing and loading packages needed for the analyses and visualization.

3.2 Preparing for the Python session

We will use Jupyter Notebooks for the Python session. The Juppter project is an open source project to support data science education and project management. Juppter Notebook is a web-based technology, meaning that all interaction with the notebooks occurs within your web browser (e.g. Firefox, Chrome, Safari, IE). A Juppter Notebook server is used to serve the notebook content. The server can be run locally on your machine by installing it directly from source or through some other distribution (e.g. Anaconda), or the server can be run in the cloud via a service (e.g. Google Colab).

Cloud-Based Beginner Level

For beginners, we **strongly recommend** the use of Google Colab, as it requires the least effort to get up and running, and it supports all the features we wish to use during the session. Google Colab does not require any installation, and you can view notebooks without a Google account. However, Google Colab does require that you have a Google account in order to run any code within the notebooks as it was designed to work together with Google Drive. To load the data files during the session you will need to be logged in to your Google Account, and we will discuss how to connect Colab to your Google Drive.

- If you do not have a Google account then you may sign up for a free account at <u>http://www.google.com</u> (Click "Sign In" in the top right corner, then click "Create Account"). The Google account should give you free access to both Google Colab and Google Drive.
- 2. To access Google Colab go to <u>https://colab.research.google.com/</u> and log in with your Google Account (Click the "Sign In" button in the top right corner). This should load the "Welcome to Colaboratory" notebook and show the open dialog where you can access additional notebooks on Google Drive, GitHub or your local system.

The open dialog can be accessed again through File > Open notebook. We encourage participants to try this out prior to attending the session, however we will briefly describe some of the Colab interface at the beginning of the session.

- 3. Upload the Python Notebooks (.pynb) and the data files (.csv) that you can find in the downloads section (4.1) to your Google Drive.
- 4. Within the Colab open dialog select the "Google Drive" tab at the top of the dialog. This will display any notebooks you have in the Colab Notebooks folder in your Google Drive account. The Colab Notebooks folder is created for you automatically the first time you save a notebook in Google Colab (or when you upload a notebook). Select the notebook from the list to open it.
- 5. From within Google Drive in your browser you can navigate to an .ipynb file, and use right- click to select the "Open with ¿" option. From the menu that pops up select "Google Colaboratory" to open the notebook in Google Colab directly.
- 6. Thorough documentation on the installation can be found <u>here</u> and also inside the Python session download (Section 4.1)

Intermediate Level

For more advanced users who would prefer a local install of Jupyter Notebooks, we recommend using the Anaconda based installation documented on the Jupyter site <u>here</u>. However, be advised that this current workshop tutorial and command has been developed for Google Colab, and will not work with a local Jupyter notebook without adjustment. Therefore we recommend you follow this workshop with Google Colab and try out local installations of Jupyter for your use at a later time. Thorough documentation on the installation can be found <u>here</u> and also inside the Python session download (Section 4.1)

4.2 Loading data into RStudio Cloud

As RStudio cloud works on a remote server, you will need to upload your data and code files into the environment to access and work with them. Here are the steps to upload your files into RStudio Cloud.

1. Locate the 'Files' window on the RStudio interface

5. Seeking help when you hit trouble

We expect that all participants **will** encounter some roadblocks during this workshop, and broadly speaking, while attempting to learn new data science skills with R or Python. This is normal, and we ask you to stick with the task. In this online format, we expect that some issues may seem more frustrating, but we ask you to stay patient, and wait to be helped. To help everyone stay on track, we are using two approaches.

- SLACK CHANNEL: Using a dedicated Slack Channel to seek help. If you are not a Slack user, please register and download the Slack app and join the 'osos2020' channel. <u>Click here to join this Slack channel.</u> IMPORTANT: Please join the Slack channel before the workshop as it will take a few minutes to get this set up. You may ask questions at any time and one of the instructors or helpers will try to answer your question. The chat function in Zoom will be disabled, so all questions are to be posted on Slack.
- 2. **BREAKOUT ROOMS:** The instructors will pause the sessions at frequent intervals to open up 'Break Out' rooms. You will be randomly assigned to a breakout room where you can work with your random group to obtain peer-to-peer assistance or use the 'Ask for Help' button to call for help. The instructor or one of the volunteer helpers will join your breakout room to help.

We have a large number of participants registered and to ensure that the session moves smoothly, please pay attention to the most common sources of errors in coding. The most common issues to expect in these workshops are:

1. Spelling and capitalization errors in code

- 2. Extra spaces or characters in code
- 3. missing quotes, parentheses, or square brackets

If none of these explain your errors, please seek help by asking for help.
